For almost twenty five years, I had been doing my job like this. I usually open my shop early in the morning by seven o' clock and close at around eleven o' clock at night. Hence I had a special reputation among the morning walkers and the people who regularly came to the vending zone for their day to day requirements or veggies. These people usually come to my shop to buy medicines and to have a chat with me on the current

trend of price hike and inflation and ultimately the topic gets twisted toward the Indian politics, particularly about the tug of war between the state and the central government and the differences between the two.

It is unfortunate for our state when we elect a party to rule the state, because every time we commit a blunder while electing a state party, it has to sit in the opposition bench at the center. And, it has to face a lot of hardships and have to fight with the central government to get sanctions from it. Our egoistic state politicians are so arrogant and stubborn that they never like to compromise with the center in any matter. Hence, though, our state is rich in natural resources like coal, iron ore, manganese and bauxite, etc., it is always being neglected by the center. Even it has to face so many difficulties and tussles with the center to get favors from them but fails every time in achieving sanctions to establish core industries within the state just because of lack of coordination between state and the center. The promises made by our chief minister to make the state industrially developed and to attract the foreign investors to the state are never accomplished. A good number of morning walkers and other people, who come to buy vegetables and to share some cups of tea with others, gossiping with each other to pass their morning time and also with a purpose to buy medicines, which were prescribed to them, gradually had become good friends of mine. Though, I knew it better than anybody that one cannot accept it as a real friendship. Rather it can be considered as a fair relation between a customer and a shopkeeper. I have to give a polite smile when known customers step into my shop and obviously I offer a cup of tea, when they take a seat and pull out their prescriptions out of the pockets of their tracksuits.

Although I don't have any interest in smiling at them, I have to. I call it a professional bright smile.

It is very difficult to satisfy an Indian customer with a gentle smile and a cup of tea. They also expect a fair amount of discount out of our own profits and I do provide them with discounts, though with flair of irritation burning inside me, but I have to digest it. So how can I accept them as good friends of mine?

Obviously, a business man never likes a major share of his profits to be left to his customers. I think it is a hopeless situation but I have to accept it. At times, some of the customers exceed the limits of bargaining. I feel as if I was getting a backlash, still I didn't have any alternative. So a broad smile spread on my face despite myself. They always feel that bargaining to the extreme extent is their fundamental right.

I have never cared for such customers and can never accept them as my genuine customers.

It is all about my business.

When I open my shop in the morning, I usually find that the surrounding is covered in a thick haze of smoke and dust. This is the combination of smoke from tea stalls and the carbon monoxide exhaled by the vehicles as well as the smoke exhaled by the old bikes which already have been past their life of fitness. But nobody likes to spend on their bikes and is not bothered to receive a certificate from the RTO and this is definitely off routed. What a ridiculous attitude!

The fogginess of the haze creates an illusion. This kind of pollution is enough to cause allergy and respiratory problems. But our government never keeps an eye on these situations, as if Lord Vishnu has gone into "ANANTA SAYANA" (eternal sleep). Even the way in which the municipality sweepers sweep the roads would be enough to pollute the entire surrounding and

cause all sorts of allergic diseases, bronchiole disorders, tuberculosis and many others.

I and my family had shifted from a nearby village, as my father started a pharmacy just opposite to the medical college hospital. It was really a good and fruitful step taken by my father after leaving the government job in the eleventh year of his career.

At that time it was a good move, because very few pharmacies were present in the town and it took much less time to settle down. As five years of idleness in the village had left us with a lot of troubles, he wanted to shift to the nearby town to earn bread for the family.

After a couple of years we relocated from our native village to my father's new business place.

I got admission in a reputed government school after successfully clearing the entrance exam, which was conducted by the school.

During my school days, I assisted my father at the shop after my school hours. Hence from the very beginning of my school days, I entered into business. At that time pharmaceutical business had a good reputation and respect and was considered second to a doctor's advice. The customers had faith in a pharmacy businessman, respected him and never bargained while buying medicines. They usually paid the actual amount what they used to buy. And thus, we made the profit that we actually deserved. People usually thought bargaining in medicines wouldn't cure their sufferings; rather the sufferings would be fortified. This was a prejudice that dominated the Indian psychology. This is because from the period of autocracy, the native ayurvedic doctors poured this thought in the people's mind and it spread like venom.

But in today's world, as the educated ratio progressed and the people became quite conscious of the situations around them by the several steps taken by the

government through electronic media and print media, people started to consider businessmen as cheats and it became mandatory to bargain in every sphere.



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I studied in Queen of the Missions High School until eleventh standard. During this time I made many good friends at school. We were innocent and so were the people. Unlike present days, life was very simple. It was as simple as a softly flowing calm river.

After completion of my school education, I got admitted in the most reputed and respected college of our town. A good number of students who graduated from this college were well established in the society, holding high government ranks. So people expected a lot from this institution because it has a good reputation of producing many scholars.

I was fancied by those stories and my mind was filled with sociocommunicistic attitude.

I started disliking the democratic policies as it opened a way for the corruptions to the optimum extent,

which Gandhiji had never dreamt of when he fought for the Indian independence from the British Raj.

Winston Churchill rightly quoted while declaring India's independence, "Indians do not know how to rule themselves."

In fact, it is true that Indians do not know how to rule themselves. Quite a number of Indians are unaware of politics, economic system, administrative system, judiciary system and above all, fundamentals of Indian legislature. And these people elect their representatives for state assembly and parliament. Even most of those representatives also lack knowledge about the Indian legislature. Most of these MLAs and MPs either belong to an autocratic family or belong to the underworld and are anti-socials. So, what would be the fate of the country which would be ruled by these classes of people? What can we expect from them?

Sadly, this is the system of our country.

An absolute reformation is essential for reforming our seventy odd year's constitution which is not meant for the current developing status of the country. Of course, so many times this trend was broken, but every time they manage to make a comeback, because they have money power, man power and last but not the least they have the knowledge of the flaws in Indian constitution, as they have been ruling for a prolonged period.

Our constitution was formed in an emergency basis which left innumerable flaws in it. The acts of evidences are so complicated that it provides many ways for a criminal's escape. For each and every crime there is a demand for eye witnesses and documentary evidences, which is not so easy to provide. There are many hardcore criminals who can do crime publicly; people don't dare to provide evidences against such criminals because there are no provisions to safeguard the lives of people who will provide the evidences and so their lives are always at risk.
